The Battle of the Bookshops by Poppy Alexander

Book: *The Battle of the Bookshops* by Poppy Alexander

1. What did you think of the book?
2. Which was the most interesting scene(s), in your opinion?
3. Were there any characters that you felt, you can relate to in any way?
4. What were your expectations before reading *The Battle of the Bookshops*?
5. Jules returns from London to help her great-aunt's bookshop. How do you feel about her decision to leave her career and move back home?
6. The rivalry between the Capelthorne and Montbeau families is central to the story. What role does that rivalry play in shaping the characters and their actions?
7. The setting of the seaside town of Portneath and the old bookshop are described in a nostalgic, cozy way. How did the setting influence your enjoyment of the novel? Did it feel real?
8. The bookish details – the dust, the shelves, the history of the shop – are quite prominent. What value do you think those details add? Did you feel a connection to the world of books and bookshops?
9. If you were in Jules's shoes: what would you do to try to save the bookshop?
10. The novel is at its heart a romance, but it also deals with family, legacy, and business. Which of these themes resonated most with you, and why?

11. What did you think of the ending? Were you satisfied with how things wrapped up?


12. The title “The Battle of the Bookshops” suggests competition, contrast, maybe even war. Did the story deliver on that idea in the way you expected? Why or why not?

1. What did you think of the book?

4. What were your expectations before reading *The Jackal's Mistress*?
5. What were your first impressions of Libby Steadman? How did your view of her change (or not) as the story progressed?
6. The novel is set in the American Civil War in Virginia, 1864. How did the setting affect your reading experience?
7. Libby faces a moral choice: help a wounded Union officer or leave him to die. What would you have done in her place?
8. How did you feel about the role of Joseph, Sally, and Jubilee?
9. The title includes “Jackal” – Jubilee calls the wounded officer a “jackal”. What meaning did you find in that nickname?
10. The attraction that develops between Libby and Captain Jonathan Weybridge is complicated. What did you think about that relationship? Was it believable?
11. One of the themes is sacrifice: what people do for others in extreme circumstances. Which sacrifice in the book moved you the most?


12. After finishing the book, was there anything you wish had been explored further (historical details, characters)?

8. Sloan is both professional (in forensic genealogy) and deeply personal (in discovering her origins). How do you feel about the balance between her career and her emotional journey?
9. The book raises issues about adoption, identity, and belonging. What do you think the book is saying about how our origins affect us (or don't)?
10. The Margolis family wields significant influence in the community. What commentary, if any, do you feel the book makes about wealth, power, and justice?

11. What did you think of the end of the book?


12. If you were in Sloan's shoes, would you have pursued the truth in the same way? What might you have done differently?

11. How does the book portray the challenges Elizabeth faces as a successful Black woman in the 19th century?



11. How does clothing – or the act of preserving these Dior dresses – reflect identity, memory, or status in the book?




1. What did you think of the book?

5. At the start, Anita Odom lives a quiet, solitary life in the island grocery.
How did you feel about her when we first meet her? How did your view of her change by the end?
6. When fourteen-year old July arrives unexpectedly, Anita is sure it's a mistake. Did you sympathize with Anita's reaction or with July's? Why?
7. July seems to have an uncanny knack for knowing what people need – even if they don't know it themselves. What did you think of this gift?
8. The setting – Ebey's End, a remote island town reachable only by ferry – is quirky and tight-knit. How did the setting contribute to the story? Would the same story feel different in a big city?
9. Many characters in the town carry secrets or live with assumptions. Which secret or revelation surprised you the most? Why?
10. How did you feel about the relationships that developed in the book?

11. Although there are serious themes (grief, change, loneliness), the book also has a warm, humorous tone. Did you find a balance between the serious and the light?





11. Why do you think the Nazis feared education and books so much?


12. Despite the setting, there are moments of hope and kindness. Did the book feel more tragic, inspiring, or both to you?


